


77th Annual Congress of the Japan Society of Obstetrics and Gynecology (JSOG). May 23-25, 2025 | Okayama, Japan.



Obituaries & Tributes.

A. In Memoriam: Professor Walfredo Sumpaico A Beloved Leader, Mentor, and Friend

It was with deep sadness that we received the news of the passing of Prof. Walfredo Sumpaico, a cherished former Secretary General of AOFOG, a pillar of the Philippine Obstetrical and Gynecological Society (POGS), and a mentor and friend to many across the Asia Oceania region. The message, conveyed by Dr. Christia Padolina, AOFOG Treasurer, touched us all deeply. Though we were aware that Prof. Sumpaico had been unwell and undergoing treatment for some time, his passing has brought a profound sense of loss.

Prof. Sumpaico took over the role of Secretary General of AOFOG following the tenure of the late Prof. Shan Ratnam — a giant in our Federation's history. He stepped into this role with quiet confidence and quickly made it his own, strengthening AOFOG through close collaboration with member societies and contributing significantly to its growth and cohesion.



He was admired not only for his capable leadership but also for his warmth and humanity. Prof. Sumpaico had a kind and joyful presence that drew people in. He listened with sincerity, offered advice with humility, and made everyone around him feel respected and valued. His gentle humor and calm demeanor helped build bridges and foster unity within the Federation.

I was privileged to work closely with him over several years, beginning with my early involvement as Chair of an AOFOG committee. He was always generous with his guidance, especially toward younger colleagues. When I eventually succeeded him as Secretary General, I knew I had big shoes to fill. Yet, in true Prof. Sumpaico fashion, he continued to encourage and support me, making that transition smoother and more meaningful.

Beyond his dedicated work in AOFOG, Prof. Sumpaico made lasting contributions to POGS and to

postgraduate education throughout the region. He was passionate about teaching and remained committed to improving women's health and advancing the capabilities of health professionals across Asia Oceania. His legacy endures in the many lives he touched and the high standards he upheld.

We also remember with great appreciation Madam Sandy, his devoted wife, whose steady presence and support were deeply felt throughout his journey. Together with their children and grandchildren, she cared for him lovingly. Every New Year, the Sumpaico family's greeting card would arrive — a symbol of joy, unity, and enduring friendship.

Prof. Sumpaico's passing is an irreplaceable loss to the AOFOG family. We will miss his wisdom, his compassion, and his unwavering dedication. But we take comfort in knowing that his spirit lives on in the work we continue, inspired by his example.

On behalf of the AOFOG Executive Board and the entire Federation, we extend our heartfelt condolences to his family and loved ones. May you find solace in knowing how widely he was respected, how deeply he was loved, and how fondly he will be remembered.

B. Appreciation and Tribute to Professor T. A. Chowdhury.

A Visionary Leader, Teacher of Teachers, and Gentle Giant of SAFOG and AOFOG

It is with profound sadness that we share the news of the passing of Prof. T. A. Chowdhury — a father figure to many, and one of the founding pillars of the South Asian Federation of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (SAFOG). His visionary leadership, tireless commitment, and unwavering dedication were instrumental in shaping and strengthening SAFOG from its earliest days.

Prof. Chowdhury was not only a towering figure within SAFOG but also played a significant role in the work of AOFOG. He served as Vice President of AOFOG, and in recognition of his outstanding contributions to women's health at both national and international levels, he was honored with the Fellowship of AOFOG — a distinction befitting a man of his stature.



In Bangladesh, and across the region, Prof. Chowdhury earned the rare distinction of being known as a "teacher of teachers". His influence as an educator and academician is immeasurable. Generations of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists trace their inspiration and training back to him. His commitment to academic excellence was unwavering — so much so that he remained actively engaged in scholarly activities until just two days before his passing. His life was a living example of devotion to learning, teaching, and service.

REI Committee Report

On 27 February 2025, the AOFOG REI Committee held an online meeting to discuss ongoing and upcoming collaborative initiatives among member countries. One of the main highlights of the session was the proposal to expand a research study on menopause, initially conducted in Hong Kong member countries.

The study focuses on understanding the experience of women during menopausal transition. Data collection is conducted in primary care settings such as family medicine or general practitioner (GP) clinics, targeting women aged 45-60 years. A total sample size of 500 participants is needed to achieve a suitable error margin. Another agenda item was the AOFOG session in Hong Kong,



coordinated by Dr. Jennifer K.Y. Ko. The session will be held as part of a two-day Fertility Preservation Seminar on 12-13 April 2025. AOFOG statement on PCOS is under discussion, the committee acknowledged the challenges of redefining PCOS. A standardized approach to treatment and management is also being drafted. The Fellowship Program in REI aims to host 2-3 fellows annually for 2 weeks to 1 month of observer ship.


On 6 May 2025, the AOFOG REI Committee discussed a major topic: the upcoming AOFOG Campus 4, which will focus on Adenomyosis. The event is scheduled to be held online via zoom on 20 May 2025. The committee also reviewed the preparations for AOFOG Campus 5, which will focus on Poor Ovarian Reserve. The event is scheduled to be held in Mumbai 1 August 2025. The committee continued discussions of the ongoing multi-country research on menopause.




The data collection will be centralized and published collectively. The committee also discussed the upcoming AOFOG statement on PCOS. The statement is expected to be ready within a month. Additionally, there is active coordination with the Japanese government through the Asian PCOS Society, aiming for public release around July – August 2025. Another update involved the REI Fellowship, which has already received institutional approval. AOFOG will send an official confirmation letter to the institution to formalize this arrangement. The committee confirmed that the next AOFOG meeting will take place in Sydney in October 2026.

On 20 May 2025, the AOFOG REI Committee successfully held the online session for AOFOG Campus 4, themed "Adenomyosis: Latest Insights, Treatment Advances, and Quality of Care." The event featured outstanding speakers from the REI Committee and was attended by 100 participants

from various countries. The presentations were enriched by interactive discussions, providing attendees the opportunity to ask questions, share perspectives, and engage in insightful dialogue with both the panelists and session chairs.





Updates regarding future activities

The REI Committee has several upcoming activities planned. The activities are AOFOG Campus 5, AOFOG Statement on REI about PCOS, AOFOG Study on REI, AOFOG Fellowship on REI Taiwan, and O&G National Society Meeting. AOFOG Campus 5 will take place at St. Regis Venue in Mumbai on 1st of August 2025. The AOFOG Statement on REI regarding PCOS will be discussed within a month. The AOFOG Study on REI about menopause will be conducted as a multi-centered study in each country that participated, with centralized data collection and a joint publication planned. The AOFOG Fellowship on REI in Taiwan has already been approved by the host institution. And the last, The O&G National Society Meeting is scheduled to be held in October 2026

The challenges of establishing an ultrasound practice or unit can be daunting. This document highlights several important considerations and provides a framework to assist clinicians.

The document was developed after a survey of more than 238 participants in an SMFM workshop and concludes with some suggestions including:

Optimal scheduling

Advanced planning of ultrasound examinations is pertinent. The document discusses the merits of two models for scheduling (1) a master schedule model, where all the exams are on the main schedule, and each sonographer takes the next patient in line when they are ready and (2) an individual sonographer schedule, where each clinical/sonographer is assigned to their own room.

Ergonomics

Work-related musculoskeletal disorders (WRMSD) are exceedingly common, affecting >90% of clinicians and resulted in loss of time at work in more than 20%. Microbreaks (30 seconds to 3 minutes) incorporated into the scheduling were proposed.

Other aspects which may be of interest to readers include layout of the unit, credentialing and audits, equipment selection, counselling, use of telehealth and developing a team involving genetic counsellors, paediatric surgeons and other clinicians.



Another update involves a consensus statement from the International Society of Ultrasound in Obstetrics and Gynaecology (ISUOG) and the European Society of Gynaecological Oncology (ESGO) in March 2025.



ISUOG/ESGO Consensus Statement on ultrasound-guided biopsy in gynecological oncology

With increasing resolution of modern ultrasound machines, a range of minimally- invasive ultrasound-guided diagnostic and therapeutic procedures has been developed. Real-time biopsy via transvaginal/transrectal approach permits close proximity to gynaecological tumours and ensures adequacy of sampling. It is not only cost-saving by avoiding referrals to another healthcare provider (eg. interventional radiologist) but also reduces patient distress and shortens the time to initiation of treatment.



In this document, a comprehensive spectrum of ultrasound-guided procedures were discussed, videlicet indications for procedures, instrument requirement and setup, approaches to sampling, technique and postprocedural care.

MFM Committee Report

The AOFOG MFM Committee held meetings on 3rd December 2024, 18th February 2025, 4th March 2025, 2nd April 2025, and 9th April 2025, all conducted via Zoom. During these sessions, committee members engaged in in-depth discussions focused on program planning, with particular emphasis on assessing the burden of postpartum hemorrhage (PPH) across the region, monitoring maternal anemia as a key indicator of obstetric outcomes, and addressing the rising rates of Caesarean sections and obstetric emergencies.AOFOG – NESOG Update on Contraceptive Management.









The Chair and members of the AOFOG MFM Committee convened during the MFM Committee meetings via Zoom.

The Committee Chair has prepared a Concept Note on Collating the Prevalence of Postpartum Hemorrhage in AOFOG Participating Countries and circulated it, along with the proforma and dummy table, to all MFM members for their feedback. The Committee Chair and members convened on 2nd April 2025 and 9th April 2025 via Zoom, focusing exclusively on these documents. This initiative aims to collect data for collaborative research and explore potential publication opportunities in the Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology Research (JOGR), as well as address other program–related considerations. Additionally, the Committee Chair and members engaged in detailed discussions regarding the organization of webinars on postpartum hemorrhage (PPH), maternal anemia, and obstetric emergencies across the region.

Recent past activities for AOFOG MFM Sessions

The 3rd International Scientific Conference of Maternal Fetal Medicine Society of Bangladesh was held at the Bangabandhu International Conference Center (BICC) in Dhaka on 2-3 February 2025.



A few members of the MFM Committee, including Prof Mahesh (Chair of the MFM Committee), Prof Firoza Begum, Prof Shama Munim, Dr U.D.P. Ratnasiri, Dr Raul Quillamor, and Dr Muhamad Alamsyah Aziz, delivered presentations at the MFM Society of Bangladesh in Dhaka, Bangladesh.

Gynaecological Oncology Committee Report

The Oncology Committee of the AOFOG had organised / participated in a few activities with a focus of different topics, aiming to exchange knowledge and promote the patients' care in gynaecological cancers.

First, the Federation of Obstetric and Gynaecological Societies of India (FOGSI) Annual Conference / 67th All India Congress of Obstetrics and Gynaecology 2025 had been successfully held on 8 – 12 Jan 2025 in Mumbai, India. Several AOFOG members including Dr. John Tait, Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa, Prof. Unnop Jaisamrarn, and Prof. Pisake Lumbiganon were attended. Dr. Ka Yu Tse was also invited to deliver two lectures, one on 'Efforts and strategies towards cervical cancer elimination by AOFOG' in the pre-conference workshop, and another on 'Robotic surgery in gynaecological malignancies' during the main conference.

Second, the University of Hong Kong and Asian Society for Fertility Preservation had invited the AOFOG to hold an AOFOG session in the Hong Kong Fertility Preservation Seminar 2025 on 13 Apr 2025. Dr. Ka Yu Tse represented the oncology committee and gave an overview on the 'Fertility sparing surgery in gynaecological oncology'. Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa, and the REI committee members including Dr. Budi Wiweko, Dr. Jennifer Ko, and Dr. Mohd Faizal Ahmad also gave other lectures on fertility preservation.


Third, gestational trophoblastic disease is rare and some oncologists are not familiar with this disease. Yet recently there are some updates like the proposal on revising the staging system and the use of immunotherapy. Therefore, our committee had organised a webinar on 'Update of Gestational Trophoblastic Disease' on 24 May 2025. The oncology committee members including Dr. Ka Yu Tse, Prof. S Sampathkumari and Prof. Jannatul Ferdous, the past chair of the REI committee Dr. Zhongwei Huang, together with other experts including Prof. Hextan Ngan, Prof. Annie Cheung, Prof. Ruangsak Lertkhachonsuk and Prof. Benoit You, had presented in the webinar covering a wide range of topics in the picture below. The webinar had more than 100 participants and there were a lot of enthusiastic discussion following each lecture.



Ongoing / Upcoming activities

1. Gynecologic Cancer Genetic Services Questionnaire

Some gynecologic cancers are associated with underlying somatic or germline genetic alterations. Today, genetic testing becomes an integral part in the management of gynecologic cancers. However, Asia-Oceania is a diverse continent with different cultures and distribution of resources. As the availability and structure of genetic testing can significantly impact the management of cancer patients and



cancer prevention of pathogenic variant carriers, the oncology committee is now conducting a survey aiming to understand the organization of the genetic testing services in Asia-pacific region and to identify any disparity. 2. AOFOG-ASGO Gynecologic Oncology Research Workshop 2025

The Oncology committee of the AOFOG and the Education committee of the Asian Society of Gynecologic Oncology (ASGO), supported by the Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Hong Kong (OGSHK), are going to organize the AOFOG-ASGO Gynecologic Oncology Research Workshop 2025 on 10 - 13 Dec 2025. It aims to deepen the knowledge and enhance the interest among individuals



interested in conducting research in gynecologic oncology. This course is the first of its kind in our field in Asia, composing of 5 series of webinars, pre-workshop mentoring, and a face-to-face workshop with lectures and round-table discussions on 10 - 13 Dec 2025. There will be more than 30 experienced experts from different specialties and countries. Each participant will have a chance to develop their own research protocol under the guidance of the assigned mentors. Apart from gynecologic cancers, we also welcome ideas in preinvasive diseases, screening, diagnosis, symptom management, and onco-fertility. At the end of the workshop, selected participants will present their projects. The top three will receive an award.

Urogynaecology Committee Report

The committee on Urogynecology comprises members from Taiwan, Thailand, Singapore, Korea, Indonesia, Malaysia, Japan, Australia, India, Bangladesh, and the Philippines. Our aim is to disseminate knowledge and skills through education, promote collaborations and partnerships, and develop consensus guidelines pertinent to the Asian region.

The committee has been regularly convening virtually and is pleased to announce the forthcoming activities. There will be a series of webinars addressing topics such as Refractory Overactive Bladder, Traditional continence surgeries for Stress Urinary Incontinence (SUI), Complications of Mesh surgery for Pelvic Organ Prolapse, Urogenital and Rectovaginal Fistula, and Painful Bladder Syndrome (PBS). The first of the webinars will be in August 2025 and will be a discussion on urinary incontinence.

To enhance awareness of various urogenital conditions, the committee will also collaborate with the Royal Thai College of Obstetrics & Gynaecology (RTCOG) in October 2025, the Philippine Obstetrical & Gynecological Society (POGS) in Nov 2025, and the Urogynecological Association of Indonesia (HUGI) in December 2025.

This October, the committee will be conducting a pre-congress workshop in cooperation with the Royal Thai College of Obstetrics & Gynaecology (RTCOG). With the help and support of the RTCOG Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery Committee headed by Prof Suvit Bunyavejchevin, a half-day workshop with didactics and hands-on practice is being prepared. The workshop, to be conducted by Suvit Bunyavejchevin, Lisa Prodigalidad, and Jennifer King, aims to update and instruct generalist obs-gynes on vaginal hysterectomy, colpocleisis, and basic cystoscopy.

In November, the AOFOG Urogynecology Committee will likewise be participating in the Annual Convention of the Philippine Obstetrical & Gynecological Society (POGS). Lectures during the plenary session and simultaneous session is being arranged in collaboration with the Philippine Society for Urogynecology and Reconstructive Pelvic Surgery (PSURPS). Prof Chris Chong has been invited to speak in behalf of the AOFOG Urogynecology Committee.

The committee remains committed to fostering collaboration and expanding the reach of urogynecological education across Asia. Plans are underway to establish a robust online platform for resource sharing and networking among specialists and institutions. Moreover, the committee is exploring opportunities to partner with other international organizations to bring a global perspective to regional challenges. These efforts aim to ensure standardized approaches to patient care while also respecting cultural and resource-related considerations unique to the Asian context.

The AOFOG Urogynecology Committee is also considering launching mentorship programs to connect experienced clinicians with early-career obstetricians and gynecologists. This initiative

would not only enhance professional growth but also ensure that knowledge and expertise are passed down efficiently across generations of healthcare professionals.

Through these endeavors, the AOFOG Urogynecology Committee aims to continually elevate the standards of urogynecology in the region, ensuring that patients receive the best possible care and that practitioners are equipped with the latest knowledge and tools.

ICOE-OGSM-AOFOG

Upon completion of the masterclass in complicated caesarean section in Kathmandu, The ICOE team made final preparation in packing mannequins and required items for two days ICOE workshop in Butwal. This is the first time ICOE Course is conducted out of Kathmandu with the support of AOFOG & NESOG.



Butwal is a sub-metropolitan city and economic hub in Lumbini Province, West Nepal. Butwal has a city population of 195,054 as per the 2021 AD Nepal census. The city is located 300 Km away from Kathmandu, the average time taken to travel by road is 8 hours but by local flight takes an hour. The Nepal maternal mortality rate (MMR) has decreased 151 per 100, 000 live births in 2021 but the Butwal MMR is at 207 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births.

On 31st March 2025, the team started our journey to Lumbhini for the 2 days ICOE workshop. Dr Rohana (AOFOG Sec Gen) and Dr Saroja (Past President of NESOG) accompanied the team.

The flight was rescheduled to two hours later due to adverse weather. We packed all mannequins in suitcases and proceeded with a relatively smooth flight to our destination.

We were welcomed by the pickup team from Butwal in Lumbhini Airport; after collecting the luggages with the training equipment, we headed for a quick visit to



buddha birth place and had lunch at the local restaurant.

With our training equipment securely placed atop the transportation van, we proceeded to Amrapali Cottage, which functioned as both our course venue and accommodation.

There was a local NESOG organized CME and dinner night arranged by Quest Pharmaceuticals, there were two lectures delivered by Dr Bishnu Gautam titled Antenatal Doppler Assessment and Dr Rohana on Current WHO guidelines on Labour Care.

ICOE workshop

This workshop organised with NESOG and AOFOG is special as the Nepal ICOE trainers travelled with the Malaysian trainers to Lumbini as a combined team.

There were 21 participants. All were O&G doctors working in the region. Some travelled for long distance to attend the workshop. They were divided into 3 groups.

The ICOE simulation course consists of 18 stations of various obstetric emergencies, all taught with mannequins of varying fidelity. The topics included Post partum Haemorrhage: medical, non-surgical and surgical management, Maternal resuscitation including advanced



rhythm, resuscitative hysterotomy, Medical emergencies: eclampsia and sepsis, Obstetric skills: MRP, breech, shoulder dystocia, instrumental delivery, OASIS and difficult D&C. Non-technical skills including patient counselling and risk management were discussed.

The team made arrangement for the ICOE workshop by setting up the rooms for the pre-skill tests and breakout sessions. Each breakout station will be led by one ICOE Malaysia team trainer and two NESOG trainer.

On 1st April 2025, the workshop started as per schedule. The opening remarks were delivered by Dr Rohana, Dr Saroja and Dr Thanee. This event also marked the official launch of the physical copy of the Second edition of the ICOE Handbook. After the opening remarks and a quick introduction, the course started as scheduled.



Participants were actively involved in the discussion, elucidating regional practices and acquiring new skills. Prior to end of the session, 6 participants were chosen to create and practice a drill scenario on cord prolapse for next day course.



The first day of the workshop concluded successfully, receiving favourable evaluations. Second day workshops on 2nd April 2025 started as scheduled with interactive sessions on adverse outcome by NESOG team, followed by Cord Prolapse drill by the participants and Risk Management by Dr. Thanee.

This was followed by the final breakout session for the day which ended smoothly. The post skill test was conducted, following which Dr Thanee concluded the course after the feedback session.




The participants attended the course and demonstrated commitment to the program. Each participant contributed to collaborative learning and skill development in the management of obstetric emergencies. Their participation in enhancing clinical competence reflects a collective

Appreciation Prof. Walfrido Wenceslao Sumpaico

"A giant walked among us mortals"

In the history of professional bodies, it is customary for us to see a singular figure standing as a pillar guiding the society. In the Asia Oceania Federation of Obstetrics & Gynnaecology Prof Walfrido Wenceslao Sumpaico – "Reddie" or "WWS" to most of us was one such. His portly erect figure and loud voice carried the spirit of the Federation over 17 years.

He was a product of the Philippines, trained in Manila and in the USA. His interests were in materno- fetal health and its propagation in Asia. The was assigned to represent the Filipino society in the AOFOG board. Gradually he became the Secretary General in the Conference held in Singapore. From there on he was the life and soul of the body. Sumpaico brought a sense of discipline and fair play to the AOFOG. He helped formulate guidelines, rewrote the constitution and was an active member at several of the resolutions brought out by the AOFOG. He was active in forming several committees and even more involved in closing committees if they did not serve the purpose. He started the concept of action committee meetings where the office bearers assembled and formulated the plans for the next year. Sumpaico being a follower of Prof SS Ratnam encouraged the Young Gyn association as he felt they would be the core for the future. As predicted, many of the erstwhile YGAs' are now office bearers of the AOFOG. He





maintained very cordial relations with the various AOFOG presidents he worked under despite them coming from varying backgrounds and some being younger than him.

Walfrido Sumpaico was a good speaker and on some of his pet topics like LSCS, Pre-Eclampsia etc. there were few better than him. He loved to teach and believed in the principle that talks meant reading a lot, assimilating the topic and reproduce it in simple words. In recognition of his tireless work, he received several plaques, awards and most of all Hon Fellowships. The most notable one being the one conferred by the Royal College of Obs, Gyn UK. He delivered many orations all over the region. He had written over 14 books, contributed chapters to more than 40 books and provided articles to 45 peer reviewed journals.

Reddie was a very competent sonologist and soon became the representative of the ISUOG in the Philippines. The wrote many books and chapters on Sonology for the gynecologists. He was responsible for the propagation of the ultrasound in the Philippines.

Sumpaico the person was a fun lover and loved to travel, see places and most of all enjoy their

local hospitality. We had a memorable trip to Mongolia, another first to Saudi Arabia and to Fiji. In all these trips there was an exciting mixture of work and fun. He loved his food and went to great extents to savor the original local cuisines. He was a friend of India and on each trip embarked on something new. His only worry was that he could not stand spicy/Chilli hot food. He loved Taiwan too and was a special friend of the TAOG





The family man - he was to the core and in "Melisande Joson Sumpaico" - Sandy to all - a pillar of strength and the "Mum" to the AOFOG. The only grouse she had was that she felt he was a "corny joker." He loved family reunions and the fun that went with it. A regular Church goer was Special Minister of the Eucharist, St. Peter's Parish, Quezon City.

My association with him was long and we hardly had any disagreements. His persistence to achieve the ideas he wanted was commendable. Like a sponge he would pick up new ideas and put them into effect. He was one of the earliest to accept the concept of "Safe Surgery saves lives" by the WHO and made sure that the AOFOG was represented in it and applied the principles of safety.



Though illness troubled him over a long period he hardly showed it and fought it effectively till the end. With his passing we miss a kind figure, a clever leader and a great friend. "May God give him the peace he so richly deserved." He was truly "Philippines gift to AOFOG"
